Recipes from 12th night

Pork Stew with Figs and Apples

layer into dutch oven, in this order:
1 large red onion, sliced into rings
10# boneless raw pork loin, cut into 1.5"
cubes, and floured.

add enough water to almost cover the meat generous salt and pepper

small package of dried whole figs

1/3 box dark raisins

generous splash of apple cider vinegar Cover and roast at 350 for 2 hours, stir, then add6 cored and thick sliced, peel on, apples


Cover and roast for another 1/2 hour (or until meat is tender). Adjust seasonings to taste.




