
Médieval Iconography

Medieval artists valued order and abstraction, as can be seen in many examples of religious art. Artists were required to incorporate a large body of doctrine, and the representation of sacred subjects became governed by fixed conventions. Form was used as a vehicle of spiritual meaning. Art became a kind of sacred writing, with a certain hierarchic grandeur.

The use of symbols enabled the artist to express the invisible, to represent that which would otherwise be beyond the domain of art. Familiar symbols would also be easily understood and allow the depiction to be clearly comprehended.

In the blend of art and writing, even simple lines and forms were expressive.



A halo, a rounded aura about the head, indicated sanctity. A halo with a cross in it indicated divinity. Divine intervention was shown by a hand coming from a cloud, in a halo with a cross. A aureole around the body denoted eternal bliss, seen in pictures of the Trinity, the Virgin Mary, and souls of the blessed.

Artists firmly obeyed the rules of a mystical mathematics. Position, grouping, symmetry and number were highly important. A church would be oriented to the rising and setting sun, with the church head to the east. Old Testament scenes would be depicted on the north of the church, and New Testament scenes on the south. Presentations of the Last Judgment would be on the west end.

The right hand was the place of honor. So, for example, St. Peter would be placed on the right hand side of Christ. In depictions of the Crucifixion, the Virgin Mary would be on the right hand side of Christ.

There was belief in the virtue of numbers, that their symmetry expressed the mysterious inner harmony of the universe.

The most important numbers were three, four, seven and twelve. Three was the number of the Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. There were four rivers of Paradise, corresponding to the four evangelists, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, flooding the world with sacred knowledge. Four elements were considered to comprise the entire material world: Fire, Water, Air and Earth. Seven was the most mystical number, comprised of four plus three, matter plus spirit. Life was divided into seven ages. There were seven graces (virtues), seven deadly sins, seven petitions in the Paternoster (Our Father) prayer,

and seven planets (The five visible planets plus the sun and moon. Planet means wanderer and these were the only celestial bodies that appeared to wander about the heavens.). Three times four is twelve, and there were twelve patriarchs and twelve prophets of ancient law in the Old Testament, and twelve apostles in the New Testament.

In the extensive symbolic code, Old Testament people were considered to foreshadow those of the New Testament. At Chartres Cathedral, Melchizedek, the priest and king who gave bread and wine to Abraham, foreshadows Christ who gave bread and wine to his disciples. In a window at Bourges Cathedral, Christ is represented as a lion, for it was thought that lion cubs were born dead and then brought to life in three days by their father, even as Christ resurrected from the dead in three days.

Symbols are also used to instruct. The four evangelists are represented by four images: a man (St. Matthew), a lion (St. Mark), an ox (St. Luke), and an eagle (St. John). So a person should embody these symbols, to have the clear reason of a man, the sacrificial nature of the ox, the courage of the lion, and like the eagle, look into the sun of heaven's radiance.

Thus, layers of meaning and instruction enriched religious art, expressed in distinct and intricate symbolism.




Officer Announcements:






